
Better business through cloud mobile productivity

Reduce data risk.

If someone on your team loses a device that has business data on it, you risk not only lost productivity but also security of sensitive data. Cloud-based storage, on the other hand, makes data available securely through an app. It also makes it far easier to restore data when a replacement device connects to it.

Drilling down

To best realize the productivity benefits for your business, be sure you've asked the following questions:

1. How much aging hardware cost you?

Look at the total cost of ownership for your on-site servers. If you're using on-site servers for your email, look at your current cost of ownership. What about your server room, including energy, heating, ventilation and air conditioning? Don't forget to factor in staff time spent maintaining on-premises hardware, too. What's your downtime, and how does that translate to lost productivity costs? Before replacing aging hardware, compare the costs of on-premise versus the cloud for your business needs.

2. Are your employees giving away valuable business information without realizing it?

Even if your business isn't yet using the cloud, chances are your employees are. But some free and consumer-grade cloud-based products make money by tracking how they get used or by distracting advertising.

"Free" services often come with other information security risks.

Evaluate all the hidden costs as you look at the value of a straight-forward license agreement.

3. How easy is it to manage mobile device apps and security?

Users need to access apps on their devices, but those apps and devices need to be managed and kept up-to-date. Does your solution provide a way for users to self-install approved apps and remotely lock and/or wipe corporate data from devices that get lost or compromised?

4. Can your people securely and simply access corporate data on personal devices?

It's likely that your employees have two or more devices. Does your mobile business solution make it easy for them to sync data from work folders to authorized personal devices? Do you have a way to manage content security on files, even outside the firewall?

Let's bust some myths

As with any technology, the cloud comes with its fair share of confusion. It's the reason so many small businesses are still using in-house servers or individual personal computer hard drives to store and maintain email data and critical documents/data. Let's dispel a few of the common myths.

Myth No. 1: If our data moves to the cloud, our business will no longer have control over our technology.

Fact: It's true that your IT staff won't be the ones to physically upgrade a server when the time comes. But you still have complete control over all your data. Often, cloud solutions are more reliable than on-premises systems, because they are maintained around the clock and are upgraded more frequently. And that means fewer headaches and less time spent maintaining hardware and upgrading software for your IT staff. Instead, they can spend more time improving business operations and launching agile initiatives

Myth No. 2: Keeping data on-premises is safer than in the cloud.

Fact: It's becoming increasingly clear that your on-premises systems aren't inherently more secure than they'd be in the cloud. And, as it turns out, <u>94 percent</u> of small and mid-size companies gain security advantages when using the cloud.

The cloud gives small- and mid-sized businesses a security edge.

In addition to Microsoft having an Office 365 dedicated security team as well as industry-leading regulatory compliance experts on staff, it's worth noting that Office 365 has a 99.9 percent uptime guarantee.

Myth No. 3: Corporate spies, cyber thieves and governments will have access to my data if it is in the cloud.

Fact: Not to worry. Your IT team manages access, sets up rights and restrictions, and provides smartphone access and options. Your company remains the sole owner: You retain the rights, title, and interest in the data stored in Office 365.

As for email, Office 365 email is encrypted when it is on the Microsoft servers, but it's not while en route from one user to another. If you send sensitive data — credit card details, social security numbers, health data, proprietary business information — through email, you need additional encryption to protect that data.

You can add Email Encryption with Office 365 from GoDaddy, which offers extra security on email in transit, making it virtually impossible for the contents of the email to be stolen. Plus, add email archiving to recover email and attachments that were accidentally deleted and to stay compliant with industry regulations.

Myth No. 4: Email in the cloud isn't any easier for your IT team.

Fact: By moving your business email to the cloud, you can rest easy knowing that the experts who created the software are taking care of the tricky maintenance, while your IT team maintains your company's capabilities and how employees use features.

IT can spend more time on the core operations that build business value rather than keeping up with persistent hardware maintenance.

Working better together

Co-authoring and co-working in the cloud

Efficient collaboration and communication are vital components in the success of every business. Researchers at the University of Virginia estimate knowledge workers spend 70 to 85 percent of their time collaborating in meetings or via email, telephone and other communication methods.

But not all of that time is spent actually collaborating. Technical issues and incompatibility eat away time and budgets. According to industry analyst firm IDC, inefficient collaboration costs organizations \$19,732 per information worker annually and accounts for an average loss of 21.3 percent in organizations' total productivity each year. That stings.

Just like in large businesses, small business employees need to work together on the same documents, such as sales reporting spreadsheets and marketing plans. An important collaboration feature of productivity tools is real-time co-authoring, which makes it possible for you and your team to edit and contribute to documents at the same time.

These cloud-based tools save as you go. So when you work together on a Word document, you see everyone's edits as they occur in real time. You can also use the version history to refer back to snapshots of the document during the editing process.

Case Study: Imagination Yoga

Imagination Yoga brings the benefits of yoga to children through adventure stories combined with yoga movements. While the founders' expertise is in yoga education for children, they are also business owners who need to work efficiently.

Previously, the founders — Jessica McClintic and Jamie and Jon Hopkins — worked from their homes and shared a single Google email account to correspond with customers and exchange financial spreadsheets, student enrollment information and new yoga lessons.

The company stored most of its documents on a computer in Jessica's home, so Jamie and Jon had no access to company information when Jessica was unavailable. They tried using Google Docs to collaborate but found the system unintuitive and problematic. Then, they studied up on Microsoft Office 365.
